



	Green collar	The product produced or service offered is environmentally “green” such as: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Solar panels• Wind turbines• Weatherization materials• Mass transit equipment• clean-up of polluted land
	Green lungs	The workplace environment is “green” in terms of worker health and safety such as: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Less toxic chemicals are substituted for more toxic chemicals• Re-engineering the work process is done to reduce exposure to toxic materials or dangerous conditions• Personal protective equipment (which can tear and leak) are the last resort in protecting workers
	Green belt	The community environment is “green” in that the facility does not increase pollution in the immediate area such as: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Air and water pollution• Minimum carbon footprint in relation to fuel consumption or pollution from transportation to and from the facility• The facility site is not left contaminated (a brownfield)
	Green wallet	There is economic justice for the employees and community such as: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Adequate living wages for a family and employees are treated with respect and dignity recognizing the contributions of all employees• Affordable and comprehensive healthcare is provided The ability to retire with dignity with a decent pension• Adequate compensation such as taxes is made to the community in relation to the revenue the company receives
